The NAIA Football Championship

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics at over 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968) and volleyball (1969-1980) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division into the NAIA structure. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity part.

ADMINISTRATION

The governing body of the NAIA is the National Executive Committee, composed of 10 persons elected by the membership. The Executive Committee is responsible for establishing the policies and determining the overall direction of the Association. The Executive Committee hires the Executive Director, who conducts the business and day-to-day operation of the National Office headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The Association is organized into 31 geographical districts spread over the 50 states and a part of Canada. Each District is governed by a District Executive Committee, the chief officer of which is the District Chair. The District Executive Committee establishes a program of championship events in various sports and individual/team champions of those district events are qualified to compete in NAIA Area and National Championship competition.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations. Certification of eligibility of all NAIA student/athletes is accomplished through a network of individuals which includes the faculty athletic representative of each institution, the District Eligibility Chair and the National Eligibility Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Any four-year college or university and upper level two-year institution in the United States and Canada which awards the bachelor's degree or equivalent, may hold active NAIA membership. Active member institutions must be fully accredited by an appropriate accrediting agency or commission.

OBLIGATION OR MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletic programs with the standards of the regulatory Associations in which they hold membership, and the NAIA. They must pay their annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the NAIA. Where institutional rules and standards are stricter than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

Media Coverage

MEDIA COVERAGE

Ottawa University sports fans can follow the Braves' action in several ways. You can read daily stories and features as Rick Peterson reports all the action in **The Ottawa Herald**, or for a weekly summary, look to Ottawa's weekly paper - **The Ottawa Times**. The Braves also will be covered by student reporters in OU's student newspaper, **The Campus**. Upon completion, the University's own student radio station, **KTJO 88.1-FM**, will carry live play-by-play of all home and away football and basketball games. Reports on OU sports events also are carried on **KOFO-Radio, 1220-AM**.

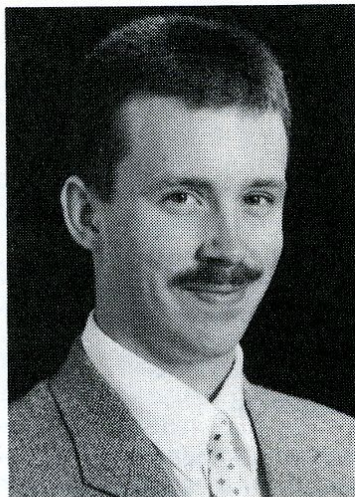

SPORTS INFORMATION

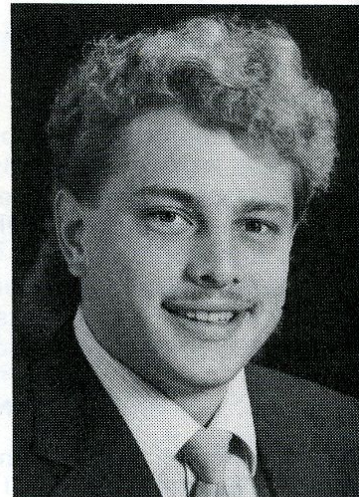

They also take statistics at various athletic events, issue news releases and feature stories about University athletes and athletic performances to hometown newspapers and radio stations and prepare the programs for OU sporting events.

Sports Information is part of the greater University Relations Office and is under the direct supervision of Wes Wilson, director of public relations.

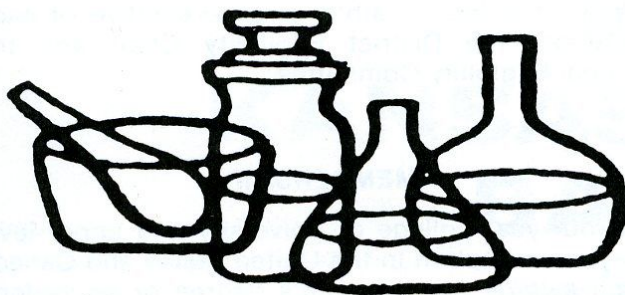

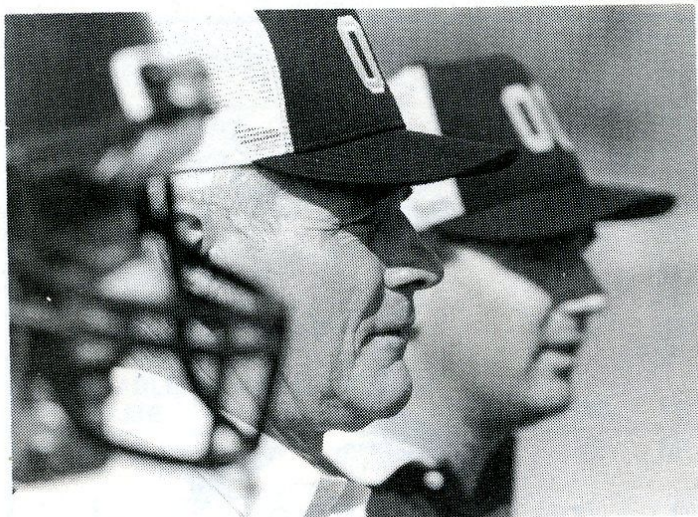

Football Coaching Staff



Head Coach Glenn Percy

COACH GLENN PERCY

Coach Glenn Percy begins his fifth year as football coach at Ottawa University. In Percy's previous four years, the Braves' record is 15-22 in conference play and 15-25 overall.

Coach Percy came to the University in 1984 and was named athletic director in 1986. Previously, he coached in several Kansas high schools including Wichita West, Kingman, Coffeyville, Hutchinson and Prairie Village.

In 1978 Percy was selected to coach the East Team for the annual East-West Kansas Shrine Bowl which the East won 34-0. Later, that same summer, he was selected as head coach for the Kansas Team in the annual Big Brother Bowl played at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City. His team won 34-6. Percy's personal career record is 128 wins, 114 losses, and five ties.

OUTLOOK FOR 1988

With sixteen starters returning, nine offense and seven defense, and many special team players returning as well, the outlook for the Braves in 1988 is brighter than it has been in several years.

In recent years, the OU defense has been called upon repeatedly to keep the Braves competitive in most every contest. The defense once again will play a major role in the success of the team, however, a stronger offensive squad will help ease the burden.

The Braves' offense has suffered in past seasons as a result of repeated mistakes and turnovers attributable to inexperience and a lack of continuity in personnel from year to year. With the return of the entire offense, with the exception of one lineman who will make the transition to defense, the Braves appear ready to improve on last year's 3-7 record.

As is the case for many teams, the Braves' early schedule will weigh heavily in the final outcome of the season. In the first four games, three of which are at home, the Braves will confront three teams who they defeated last season.

ASSISTANT COACHES

Carl Boldra, quarterback of the 1986 Braves' football team, will work with the offensive backs once again this year. Carl started his coaching career at OU last year.

Ron Gardner, returning for his third year on the OU coaching staff, serves as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. From 1964-74 he was defensive coordinator for Shawnee Mission East High School under then head coach Glenn Percy. He was head coach for seven years at Concordia High School and his latest coaching assignment was as defensive coordinator for Olathe South High School where he presently teaches.

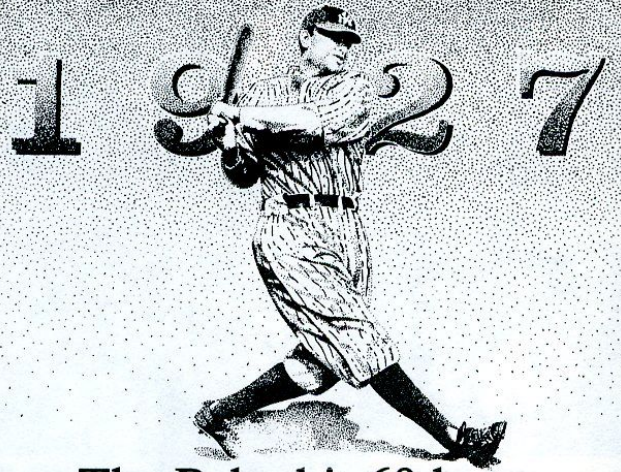
Jim Grogan, a 1953 OU alumnus, is now in his 15th year on the OU coaching staff. Grogan, who now coaches the receivers and tight ends, was the defensive back coach for seven years. He also coaches in the Ottawa USD 290 school system. While at OU, Grogan was a four year letterman. His wife, Doris, and son, Scott, also are alumni.

Brad O'Dea, a veteran of ten seasons as assistant coach, will be working with the linebackers and defensive ends. A 1968 OU alumnus, O'Dea during his college years was named All-Conference for three years, All-District for two years, and named All-American as a senior.

Mark Percy now is in his fifth year as defensive back coach. His previous coaching experience includes Allen County Community College and Washburn University.
