

EDU 66512 KA ESOL Methods in the Classroom (1 credit)

Course Description: Geared toward teachers from all grades and subject areas, attendees will participate in group presentations, evaluate research, and discover strategies for supporting all levels of English Language Learners (ELLs).

At the completion of this course, attendees will feel confident in their ability to pass the PRAXIS test for ELL certification, understand the structure of the English language, identify how language is acquired, gain awareness for the ELL/ELD standards within their state, and gain clarity regarding policies and legal precedents impacting ELLs in public education.

Teachers completing this course will gain perspective, clarity, and data to better understand how to support, encourage, and empower their ELL students. They will also have time to apply the strategies and information to their current role and any instructions and/or assessments utilized in the classroom.
