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Eleanor May Keith, of the class of 1889, died at the home of her parents in Ottawa, Kansas, June 15th, 1898, at the age of 28 years, 4 months and 7 days. After taking her preparatory work in the Academic department of Ottawa University she completed the regular college course in three years time and gained the degree of L. B. in 1889.

The four years following her graduation

were spent in teaching in the Ottawa High School.

In the fall of 1893 she entered the University of Chicago, from which institution she obtained the degree of Ph. B. in 1894. She spent a second year in study at the University and intended eventually to win the degree of Ph. D. Her record at Chicago was an enviable one.

From 1895 until her last illness, when her resignation was most reluctantly accepted, she was a teacher of Modern Languages in

the High School of Akron, Ohio.

Friends of her girlhood knew that she possessed a mind, keen and retentive, a disposition quiet and lovable, a temperament not easily ruffled, and a Christian character markedly conscientious and steadfast, yet friends who were privileged to watch the developement of her young womanhood felt that they, alone, realized the depth and strength of her character.

A development of mind and heart, noticeable and constant, was the marked feature of her life. Though brief, her life was complete.

We mourn, wherever she was known, even though it be her gain.

and will be greatly missed in the work she loved so dearly and performed so faithfully.

In the completeness of her consecration to Christ, in the nobility of her purposes, in the tenderness of her sympathies, in her wholehearted service for others: in all these, her's was truly the Christ-life.

The news of the death of Robert Atkinson, January 17, 1899, comes as a shock to the Alumni and to all friends of Ottawa University. Mr. Atkinson has been intimately connected with the school since 1868, and to him, more than to anyone else, the University owes its existence and the prominence which it has gained among similiar institutions of the country. Many times in the University's history he has come to its aid, donating time and financial support to sustain the life of the institution to which he was so closely connected. The graduates of Ottawa University can never forget him and his kindly deeds; many of them have received kindly encouragement and often more substantial aid has been advanced. Robert Atkinson was born in Toronto Canada, August 24, 1824. In 1868 he came to Kansas under commission of the American Home Mission Society to look after the interests of their school at Ottawa. Ever since that time he has been connected with the University. He resigned his position as trustee in 1883, but was re-elected in 1889, and was a member of the Board at the time of his death.

"Mr. Atkinson was a man of wide vision, clear perception, strong convictions, intrepid will and indomitable perseverance. \*\*\*\*

Concerned with great things, he had no interest in what seemed to him short-sighted measures, and many times, through his devotion to the interests involved and his convictions of duty, he took strong positions, the necessity for which to him personally was distasteful indeed. As the days pass by, his splendid abilities will be increasingly missed and an appreciation of his character and service will constantly grow."
