FRANKLIN COUNTY O. U. STUDENTS, 120

**OBTAIN HIGHER EDUCATION
WITHOUT TAX LEVY.**

**Many Other Towns Obligated To
Support Junior College, Get-
ting Less for Money.**

Ottawa University this year is providing college education for 120 Franklin county students at no cost to taxpayers. While other towns the size of Ottawa in the state are maintaining expensive, tax-supported junior colleges for their students who are able to obtain only two years of advanced work, Ottawa may and does send its students to a fully accredited, four-year university at a small tuition cost.

That phase of the university value to the community is not apparent until it is known that possibly half the families in Ottawa have had one or more members attending Ottawa University from one to four years. Some of these students though of meager circumstances, have secured an education at O. U. They have gone out to win fame and fortune.

Many of the students who have attended the university have remained in Ottawa to occupy places of responsibility. Almost all of the business institutions in the city have at least one or more former O. U. students or alumni in the firm.

In spite of the fact that Ottawa University is one of the biggest assets to the city, it probably is the realization of what the school has done for the youth of the past, what it is doing in the present, and what it will do in the future, that leads local citizens to unite so solidly in the Chamber of Commerce-sponsored drive for \$5,000 to go to the current university budget. The campaign will open April 21 under the leadership of J. L. Wassmer who will direct a corps of 65 workers in soliciting contributions.

Plans and workers for the Ottawa University drive are in readiness for the opening which is to be on April 21, the 72nd anniversary of the founding of the school. A dinner to be held Tuesday evening at 6:30 at the Nelson hotel will give team members information which they will use in

soliciting gifts beginning Wednesday morning.

J. L. Wassmer, who is directing the \$5,000 campaign for the Chamber of Commerce, said he believes everyone of the 65 persons associated with the work is enthusiastic in the hopes of completing the drive early. "If everyone will do a fair share," Wassmer said, "I think that we will have no difficulty in reaching our goal."

The team captains are Edmund Lister, John G. Kaiser, J. E. Colby, Harold J. Lamb and R. M. Clogston. Each will lead a team of 10 members. Two special teams having as members A. C. Carpenter, Arthur Willis, Bert Anderson and Fred Fockele will assist in the solicitation.

Mrs. E. E. Haley and A. F. Stephenson will handle clubs and organization subscriptions. Last year such groups gave liberally to the fund and it is expected they will do so again this year.

The publicity and foreign-owned stores committee is composed of M. H. Forester, S. F. Harris and Claude Webb.

The headquarters for the drive will be in the office of the Gas Service company at 208 South Main. The office will be open every morning and from 4 to 5 in the afternoon. Contributions may be made to the campaign by going to the headquarters.

At the dinner tomorrow evening Dr. Andrew B. Martin and several members of the university board will speak concerning the school and the uses to which money raised will be put.

START TOMORROW

Subscription Blanks Will List
Advantages Of Having O. U.
As a Town Asset

The lid will be blown off the
Ottawa University drive for \$5,000
sponsored by the Chamber of
Commerce, tonight at a workers'
dinner at 6:30 in the Nelson hotel.
Actual campaigning by the
five teams will begin tomorrow
morning.

Subscription blanks to be used
in soliciting funds remind the
contributors of the many advan-
tages of the university being lo-
cated here. The fact that stu-
dents and faculty members an-
nually spend at least \$170,000 in
Ottawa leads the list. Other ad-
vantages disclosed are that a
third of those enrolled at the
school are from Franklin coun-
ty and that O. U. is a fully ac-
credited 4-year college. The twin
development of the university and
town is emphasized. Prospective
donors are reminded that the \$1-
250,000 investment saves Ottawa
from \$8,000 to \$40,000 annually,
the amount which would be need-
ed to support a junior college.
Other towns the size of Ottawa
in the state not having 4-year
colleges maintain junior colleges.

The list of advantages further
points out that over 5,000 stu-
dents have attended Ottawa Uni-
versity and that at least 50 per
cent of the more substantial fam-
ilies of the city have had some
member attending the school.
Since the enrollment each year is
made up of students from many
states, in addition to those peo-
ple from Ottawa, the general com-
mittee feels that O. U. is one of
the best publicity assets the town
has.

J. L. Wassmer, chairman of the
drive committee, said that every-
thing is in readiness to begin
work. All workers are confident
of the success of the campaign,
Mr. Wassmer said.

REPORT \$1,196.50 PLEDGED FOR O. U.

NOT ALL WORKERS HAD
TURNED IN FIGURES

Hoped Major Portion of \$5,000
Sought Will Be In Tomorrow—
O. U. Radiocast a Big Hit

A mid-morning report on the Ottawa University drive showed the teams had turned in \$1,196.50. The goal is \$5,000. J. L. Wassmer, director of the campaign, said the committee has confidence that the movement will be successful but that it will be necessary for workers to call on all contributors as early as possible. It is hoped the major part of the soliciting will be completed by tomorrow night.

Allen Mansfield and Elmer Manley, members of the J. E. Colby team, were the first pair to make a complete report. Over half of the workers this morning had not made an initial check-up. Mr. Wassmer was calling all captains asking that team members make some sort of a report today.

Workers were finding that most who are being called on were willing to make contributions in fairly large amounts. There were very few refusals.

The fact that the drive opened on the anniversary of the founding of the university seemed to give impetus to the campaigning. Many Ottawans last night listened to the birthday broadcast over station WREN. The choir, orchestra and quartet made hits with the radio audience. Prof. Everett Fetter played a violin solo and Prof. Edgar D. Kerr gave a vocal solo. Alfred Stout, Howard Doman and Edith Clemmons announced the program. The Ottawa University drive for \$5,000 was slowly moving the half-way mark, there being \$1,950 reported this morning. J. L. Wassmer, chairman, urged workers to complete their calling and report as soon as possible to campaign headquarters in the Gas Service company office at 208 S. Main.

It was announced yesterday that gifts in the drive will count on Ottawa Foundation memberships, a large number of which are held by Ottawans. Many alumni, most of whom are members, have inquired about this point.

Gifts outside of Ottawa this year will amount to between \$20,000 and \$25,000. While last year sources other than Ottawa contributed a similar amount, Ottawa was raising \$10,000. That is another reason for the workers in the present effort believing they will be successful.

The teams captained by J. E. Colby were leading in the number of subscriptions reported. All but one of Colby's teams have at least made partial reports. Of the 25 teams in the drive 15 have made incomplete check-ins and 10 have not as yet turned anything into the office.

Solicitors indicated that practically all of those being asked for gifts were responding enthusiastically. The few who made no gifts would have done so, if financially able.

Roberts won the 2-mile event by a narrow margin after Klingman of Wesleyan had made a final stretch effort. Roberts took the lead at the start of the grind and never was headed. In the half-mile event Fergus of Ottawa came from behind in the stretch to win.

Keith Smith's performance against the hot shot sprinters of Wesleyan was pleasing. In both the 100 and 220 yard dashes he stayed close to the bunched Wesleyan stars and in the latter event pulled up to take third. Another pair of weeks with emphasis on form will make him a contender for points in the conference.

Asa Eagles earned a first in the javeline with a 183-foot toss in the hard wind. Koehler and Mattis came through in the hurdle events as expected although the wind blowing down hurdles made the race difficult. In the highs Edward Wiberg was a close second to Koehler.

Lyman Morgan won the high jump with a leap of five feet, 10 inches. Ottawa won the relay.

Ottawa earned a draw in the tennis matches by winning two doubles and one single.

Limestone Bulldog Back from Baldwin Brightly Painted Up

Equipped with a pair of fiery red eyes, dark brows and a black collar, artistically painted on, the C. M. Vincent Monument company's limestone bulldog was returned to its historic post on Main street yesterday afternoon. Wendell Plank and Homer Jacobus, Ottawa students at K. U., driving through Baldwin yesterday, spotted the missing object near the Baker University bell which was purloined recently by O. U. students and returned. They carried the dog to their car and left town hurriedly.

The report is that the dog was

taken from its place in front of the monument works eight days ago by Baldwin high school students, and that school officials ordered it returned to Ottawa, but that instead it was left on the Baker campus. Lending credence to the theory that Baldwin high school students took the dog are the initials "B. H. S." painted on it. Part of the base was broken some time after it disappeared. The limestone dog has been doing lookout duty in front of Ottawa monument shops for 55 years except on occasions when it was removed by pranksters, later to be returned.
