

BAKER GAME TUESDAY

O. U. Plays Jewell Tonight as Prelude to Hot Game.

Tickets for the Ottawa-Baker University basketball game to be played next Tuesday night in the junior high school gym here, are on sale at the North American hotel coffee shop. They are 40 cents with no extra charge for reserving.

The team closed weeks of intensive practice last night and left early this afternoon for Liberty, Mo., to meet the William Jewell team in a non-conference game. Ernest Klauman is not eligible but may be over scholastic difficulties by next week in time for the Baker game.

Next week will see the opening of the conference season in earnest with all of the teams participating in contests which will figure in the standings. The Baker team, which played several games at the beginning of the season, has had a rest for about two weeks and should be in fine shape for the game with the Braves Tuesday night. The Bakerites are being groomed as potential champions and want to get off to a good start by taking their friendly Ottawa enemies into camp.

Then there is the memory, as far as the Wildcats are concerned, of that last game last season which the Braves won that enabled them to take the conference championship. It was a perfect setting for a spectacular game and enthusiastic fans filled every space in the gym. Baker started impressively and led at the half. As the second got under way news came from Emporia to the effect that C. of E. had beaten the strong McPherson Bulldogs, thus giving the Braves a chance to win a clear title to the championship by beating Baker. And so with only 10 minutes to play the Braves uncorked a sensational attack on the goal that overcame a 10-point Baker lead and gave them a 43 to 39 victory and the conference championship.

The memory of that sweeping rally which swept them off their feet will bring a fighting crew from Baker to avenge that stinging defeat. It should be a classic of the present season.

KLAUMAN IS ELIGIBLE?

Hoped O. U. Center May Play Against Baker Tomorrow Night

Ottawa University will open its 1936 Kansas conference season tomorrow night on the junior high court against Baker University. The varsity game will start at 8 o'clock while a preliminary between the freshmen of the two schools will begin at 7 o'clock. Reserve seat tickets are on sale at the North American hotel coffee shop. They are 40c each.

The camp of the Braves has been considerably cheered by the announcement that Ernest Klauman, big center may be eligible. This would mean that Heine of Baker would have a bit more difficult time in getting the jump. Ottawa would have more height under the basket. Adrean Miller who has been playing center would possibly be shifted to guard teaming with Allan Pett. Gerald Barker and Clarence Daylight will probably be the starting forwards.

Regardless of the eligibility of Klauman the Wildcats from Baldwin still have a big edge in dope, but the Braves believe that they can be upset. The Baker sharpshooters—and there are five of them, Beiser, Quear, Heinie, Schrey and Albertson—so far this season have been able to hit the basket from almost any angle and do it regularly. It has seemed that if any one of them was off, the other four were fairly burning up the net.

Ottawa has a bit of potential scoring power and may be able to hit the basket accurately once in a while. Should the Braves be hot, the Baker crew could not be cold and beat them. Either team will have to go at top speed to win the game even though Baker does have the heavy advantage in dope.

Ottawa expects a large crowd at the game. There will be seats enough for everyone and plenty of entertainment. The university band will be out and the girls' pep club will put on a stunt between halves.

OLD RIVALS TO PLAY

Klauman Eligible for Big Baker-O. U. Game Here Tonight.

Two long time rivals, Ottawa University and Baker University, will take the court in the junior high school gym tonight at 8 o'clock in the first Kansas conference basketball game to be played here this season. The freshman teams will play a preliminary starting at 7 o'clock.

Ernest Klauman, tall center of the Braves, will be eligible to play and in the starting lineup. While his entry into the game will not overcome the tremendous pre-game edge that the Bakerites have been given, it should mean the Braves will have a better chance to upset the dope and win.

Baker and Ottawa teams have been at the business of competing against each other a long number of years. Time was when the Braves held the basketball supremacy and had little difficulty in setting too swift a pace for their neighbors of the north. But times have changed and Coach Emil Liston is bringing down a Baker team tonight that is doped by sports followers to win the conference title this season.

The Baker regular team composed of Beiser and Quear at forwards, Heine at center, Schrey and Albertson at guards has been machined down until the passing and general attack is smooth and fast. The individual scoring of each man is so great that usually three of the team will be hitting the basket heavily during a game.

Against this combination Ottawa University will throw four men, Gerald Barker and Clarence Daylight at forwards, Ernest Klauman at center and Allan Pett at guard who scored so well that the Braves won the Kansas conference crown last season. The fifth man is Adrean Miller who is playing his first year with the squad. He has already proved he can score in the games in which he has already competed. Baker should take a friendly warning and watch him with as much zeal as possible when there is a Barker, a Klauman and a Daylight to be watched, for the Belpre boy is apt to drop the ball through the hoop with some degree of regularity.

It should be a battle that will be packed full of thrills. Referee Ernest Quigley will work the game so fans are assured the big battle will be under control all the way.

Reserved seats are 40 cents and will be on sale until 6:15 at the North American hotel coffee shop. Coach Charles Dee Erickson said this morning that even though there is a great deal of interest in the game, there will be plenty of room for all who wish to attend.

BRAVES IN BOW TONIGHT

BAKER'S STRONG TEAM IS HOST TO OTTAWA CAGERS.

Ernest Klauman, Star Center, May Return to the Baptists' Line-up Against State Rival.

OTTAWA, KAS., Jan. 13.—The Ottawa university Braves make their Kansas conference bow when they meet the strong Baker Wildcats in Ottawa tomorrow night.

Ernest Klauman, star center and Ottawa mainstay, probably will be able to overcome scholastic difficulties and be eligible to play. Klauman was unable to appear in the previous pre-season encounter with Baker in which the Wildcats defeated the Braves, 43 to 29.

Coach Dee Erickson of Ottawa has been sending his team through intensive practice the last two weeks, training for the Baker tilt. Ottawa showed improvement in the William Jewell game, won by the Braves, 30 to 14.

The starting line-up for Ottawa probably will be Barker and Daylight at forwards, Klauman at center and Pett and Miller at guards. Quear and Beiser, forwards; Heine, center, and Albertson and Schrey, guards, will start for Baker.

A bit of side play at the K. U.-Nebraska game: Coach Dee Erickson and party sat on the front row much interested in a fast break by the Jayhawks. Down the court swept E. C. Quigley. He was watching things pretty close, but out of the corner of his eye he caught sight of Erickson and took time out to fling out, "Hello, Dee, congratulations!" He scooted on down the court. PRIMED TO OPEN CONFERENCE PLAY

McPHERSON MEETS O. U. HERE
TONIGHT AT 7:45.

Both Teams Claim Injuries But
Is Expected Stars Will Play—
Probable Lineups.

The lid will be blown off the 1935 Kansas conference football race tonight on Cook field at 7:45 when the Ottawa University Braves tangle with the McPherson College Bulldogs. Both teams are ready to go. The McPherson squad left the home town early this morning for the trek to Ottawa and arrived here shortly after noon.

Fans who know their football say that even though the Bulldogs have a slight edge in dope there is going to be a football game tonight on Cook field. Both teams will be keyed high and hope to have the punch that will carry the ball over the last marker for a few touchdowns. Thus far McPherson has found Zuhars and Haun able to trot on several occasions 75 or 80 yards to touchdowns. The Braves hope to put a stop to this and think they will be able while they are launching a few marches on their own account.

Both teams claim a few injuries. Ottawa lists Bill Mattis with a sore ankle and a bruised shoulder, Joe Lynch with an injured shoulder, Paul Dietrich with a cut over his eye, and George Lister with a bone broken in his foot. McPherson lists Zuhars, Haun, Reinecker and Rock as injured. All of these men on both teams with the possible exception of Lister and Reinecker are expected to play. Dietrich of Ottawa and Zuhars and Haun of McPherson are in the probable starting lineups.

This morning Coach Dee Errickson nominated Gerald Barker and Lloyd Frear to start the game at halfbacks, Hugh Mullen at quarter and Henry Loveless at fullback. This quartet has ability, brains, punch and power. All four can pass, Loveless and Mullen can kick, all can run with the ball, all are fair blockers. Defensively these four can do pretty well. In this respect Frear is the standout. In the Jewell game the Blue Mound boy played the greatest defensive game he has ever played.

Coach Melvin Binford, whose team is out after a clear title to the Kansas conference crown, nominated Zuhars and Haun for halfbacks, Crabbe at quarterback and Burress at fullback. The speed and experience of this veteran bunch will give the Braves no little trouble tonight.

Errickson will start Pett and Klamman at ends, Pitts and Harrop at tackles, Dietrich and Daugharthy at guards and Martz at center. Binford will start Moore and Barngrover at ends, Colwell and Reinecker at tackles, Vasquez and Seidel at guards and Wiegand at center.

Reserved seats will be on sale until 6 o'clock at the Davis-Wassmer clothing store. At 7:00 they will go on sale at the gate of Cook field.

An energetic Ottawa University football squad finished the last heavy workout yesterday before the Kansas conference opener against McPherson Friday night on Cook field. After a 2-hour drill the men of Errickson were still on their toes and raced into the dressing rooms with plenty of chatter about the forthcoming game with the Bulldogs.

They are not overconfident. They could hardly be that way with Zuhars, Haun and company descending on the Braves with plenty of speed and deception. It will be two veteran teams against each other.

Heading the group of officials will be none other than the veteran E. C. Quigley who is fresh from the world series baseball games. It is to be remembered that Mr. Quigley kept his honor and respect as an umpire in the big contest and had no fights with either team. It is a safe bet there will be no rough stuff in the game Friday night. Quigley sees just about all that goes on and can step off penalty yards without the least hesitancy. If the boys want to make it a rough game, Mr. Quigley will carry the ball for more yards than either team. No rough game is predicted, however, as both teams ordinarily play clean ball. Steve O'Rourke, a good official also, will be the umpire while a Mr. Myers will be head linesman.

O. U. Took a 13 to 0 Beating— Ottawa's Offense Ineffective.

McPherson College rode to victory over Ottawa University last night at Cook field on the wings of a fleet halfback by the name Truman Haskell, a freshman. After about the first three minutes of play he traveled around the Ottawa right end and as three Ottawa tacklers failed to hold him he raced 47 yards for a touchdown. In the second quarter he slipped speedily around the Ottawa right end for one yard and a touchdown after the Braves' forward wall had held the Bulldogs for 3 downs.

Backfield speed which McPherson seems to have in quantity with Zuhars, Haskell, Crabbe and Burress spelled the difference in the victory. The Ottawa line was a smooth machine on defense, but the Ottawa ends and backfield failed to keep up with the speedy Bulldog backs. The tough McPherson line stopped the Ottawa backs for short gains.

The Ottawa passing attack which was used for a total of 16 passes was dangerous at all times and four times flashed brilliantly to give quite a bit of encouragement to the home town fans. Barker opened the second half with a 32-yard pass to Mullen and not long afterwards flipped a 28-yard toss to the same receiver.

The McPherson team kept the Braves well back from the scoring territory and the Braves never did have the ball within their possession inside the McPherson 20-yard line.

Ottawa also kept the Bulldogs well away from their scoring line except for the two times that the McPherson team carried the ball across the line.

The glory for the Ottawa players—what there was—should go to the defensive work of Pitts, Eagles and Harrop at tackles, Daugharthy and Dietrich at guards, and Martz at center. Loveless and Mullen were the most effective Ottawa players on offense.

Gordon Daugharthy suffered a severely wrenched right elbow. Bill Mattis had his injured shoulder re-bruised and had to leave the game.

Next week Ottawa meets Kansas Wesleyan on Cook field.

PRIMING FOR WESLEYAN

O. U. Braves Hope To Hit Stride in Friday Night's Game.

With fair skies looming up for practice and the game itself, Ottawa University football hopes once more were rising as the team went about the business of preparing for the Kansas Wesleyan engagement Friday night at Cook field. The reserved seats are on sale at the Davis-Wassmer clothing store.

Coach Charles Dee Errickson has indicated that there may be some shifts in the lineup. These would be made in the hopes that the team would have a better running attack.

Kansas Wesleyan will invade Ottawa with another good team and with the expectation of winning over the Braves. They won from the Bethany Swedes last week 21 to 7 even though the pass-flipping Swedes outscored them in first downs. That was the first victory for the Salina team and may have pointed the way to a fairly good season in conference play.

The Braves still think that they have a lot of power and will be using it if possible Friday night. One or two costly mistakes in defense will be straightened out this week. The ends and halfbacks will be a bit more alert and may play wider. The center of the Ottawa line did a nice job of defensive play and should be just as effective this week. Consequently if the Ottawa halfbacks and ends play smarter ball the defense may be much better.

Boys From Salina Have Visions of Conference Championship.

Ottawa University's football team is getting ready for its second conference start of the season this week when it meets Kansas Wesleyan on Cook field Friday night.

Coaches A. B. Mackie and Gilbert Robinson have visions of a conference championship as do a few other coaches in the conference. Mackie thinks he has a right fair bunch. With the help of Gilbert Robinson, who used to be a Coyote ball lugger of no mean ability, he is rapidly forming a pretty good team. And believe it or not these Kansas Wesleyan teams in the past have been tough. They play a rugged, tough brand of football calculated to sweep everything from their path. Hard driving off-tackle plays are their strength and they should have power on these this year.

The Braves, however, have not been daunted by their defeats and do not expect to be at much of a disadvantage Friday night. They will more than likely play a different type of game than they did last week. Probably there will be more punch and versatility in their attack. A shift or so in the line may give the Braves more power in blocking.

The defense on end runs has been changed a bit and it is expected that Wesleyan will not gain much around that way. The air attack of the team is being strengthened considerably and should be a potent medicine in keeping the Wesleyan backfield from playing too close to the line.

BAKER POURED IT ON

O. U. Held Conference Leaders Close Until Near Finish.

Before a large and enthusiastic crowd, Baker University downed Ottawa University 52 to 35 on the junior high school basketball court here last night. The game was evenly fought until the last few minutes when the Bakerites staged a rally that put the game on ice. Then Coach Charles D. Erickson sent in his reserves and the Baker regulars poured in the baskets to make a lopsided score.

The Baker team with Albertson and Beiser hitting ran up a nice lead at the start of the game but a dogged Ottawa team with five men scoring under the inspired leadership of Joe Lynch, came back to closely trail the Bakerites 21 to 25 at the half. The Braves started the second half with a flash that tied the score at 25-all within a few minutes. Thereupon the Wildcats put on the pressure and soon pulled away to a comfortable margin.

As usual the game was chuck full of thrilling plays for the fans. The uncanny shooting of Schrey and Albertson for Baker brought shivers to the Ottawa crowd. These two guards scored 14 and 15 points, respectively. Barker scored 9 points for Ottawa. Lynch scored 8 points and Daylight 7. One of Daylight's shots was an underhanded flip at the basket while he was closely guarded. A roar went up from the crowd as the shot dropped through the hoop.

Two boys playing their first year of regular ball for the Braves, Joe Lynch and Adrean Miller, looked plenty good. Besides breaking into the scoring column nicely they both played excellent floor games. With a little more experience these two will be valuable additions to the team.

The dazzling speed and accurate registering of the Baker team gave indication that the Wildcats have a top-notch shot at the conference crown, but it is a long, rough road to travel with many upsets in prospect and Baker is liable to be among those upset. There are two or three teams in the conference able to do that should the Wildcats have an off night. It is easy when the ball slips through the hoop and not roll around as it did for Miller last night, but when it simply refuses to go through any good team is apt to become a bit nervous and drop a ball game.

The Braves show promise. Their offense will be more machined down in a week or so and their eye for the basket will be better. On many occasions last night the team play of the Braves was smooth and looked better than that of the Wildcats.

It is going to be a good season and who knows what will happen before Baker and Ottawa meet in the season final at Baldwin March 4!

Tomorrow the Braves leave on a trip to meet Bethany at Lindsborg tomorrow night and Kansas Wesleyan Friday night at Salina.

BAKER IN STRONG FINISH

OTTAWA FAILS TO KEEP PACE IN SECOND HALF AND LOSES.

The Wildcats Lead, 25 to 21 at Intermission, but Pull Away When Schrey, Beiser and Heinie Start Hitting.

OTTAWA, KAS., Jan. 14.—The Baker Wildcats took an undisputed lead in the Kansas conference by defeating the Ottawa university Braves in a hard fought basket ball game here tonight, 52 to 35. Baker took an early lead and held it until the end of the first half, when they were leading 25 to 21.

Ottawa University won a thriller from the Bethany College basketball team last night at Lindsborg, 30 to 29. With less than two minutes to play Gerald Barker dropped in a free throw that won the game.

The Swedes started out with a heavy offensive but Ottawa on goals by Barker and Daylight came back to lead at the half 15 to 14. At the beginning of the second half the Braves opened up and soon held a 24 to 15 advantage. Then the Swedes rallied and pulled up to tie the Braves at 27-all on Cole's counter. Ottawa took the lead a minute later and was tied again by Bruce's basket. It was then that Bruce fouled Barker and went out of the game as the Ottawa forward dropped the ball through the basket. In the remaining minute and a half the Braves held possession of the ball most of the time and made their free throw lead stand until the final whistle.

Barker scored 14 points for Ottawa and Cole scored the same number for Bethany.
