





The NAIA Football Championship

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics at over 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenent of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968) and volleyball (1969-1980) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division into the NAIA structure. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity part.

ADMINISTRATION

The governing body of the NAIA is the National Executive Committee, composed of 10 persons elected by the membership. The Executive Committee is responsible for establishing the policies and determining the overall direction of the Association. The Executive Committee hires the Executive Director, who conducts the business and day-to-day operation of the National Office headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The Association is organized into 31 geographical districts spread over the 50 states and a part of Canada. Each District is governed by a District Executive Committee, the chief officer of which is the District Chair. The District Executive Committee establishes a program of championship events in various sports and individual/team champions of those district events are qualified to compete in NAIA Area and National Championship competition.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations. Certification of eligibility of all NAIA student/athletes is accomplished through a network of individuals which includes the faculty athletic representative of each institution, the District Eligibility Chair and the National Eligibility Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Any four-year college or university and upper level two-year institution in the United States and Canada which awards the bachelor's degree or equivalent, may hold active NAIA membership. Active member institutions must be fully accredited by an appropriate accrediting agency or commission.

OBLIGATION OR MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletic programs with the standards of the regulatory Associations in which they hold membership, and the NAIA. They must pay their annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the NAIA. Where institutional rules and standards are stricter than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

MEDIA COVERAGE

Sports fans can follow the Braves' action in many ways. You can keep up with the Braves in the Ottawa Herald as Rick Peterson reports all the action. Sports Information Directors, Dave Dick and Craig Douglass, will cover the action for The Ottawa Times, while staff reporters will assist them in covering the beat for The Campus, the University newspaper. With the Braves competing in the KCAC, statewide media coverage has increased to include such major newspapers as the Topeka Capital-Journal, the Wichita Eagle-Beacon, the Hutchinson News, and the Kansas City Star and Times.



SPORTS INFORMATION



Football Coaching Staff



Head Coach Glenn Percy

COACHES

Head Coach Glenn Percy is starting his fourth year as head coach at OU. His overall conference record is 12-16, and overall he stands at 12-18.

Percy came to Ottawa University in 1984 after two years as head coach at Wichita West High School. His first coaching assignment was in Pleasanton, Kansas. Percy has coached at five other high schools: Kingman, Coffeyville, Hutchinson, Prairie Village, and Ponca City, Oklahoma.

In 1978 Percy was selected to coach the East Team for the annual East-West Kansas Shrine Bowl which the East won 34-0. In the summer of 1978 he was selected as the head coach for the Kansas Team in the annual Big Brother Bowl played at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City. His team won 34-6. Percy's overall record is 125 wins, 107 losses, and 5 ties.

COACH PERCY'S OUTLOOK FOR 1987

This year head coach Glenn Percy faces many new challenges. With a number of key players having graduated and 27 players returning from last year's squad, Percy is faced with an unusually young team in what will undoubtedly have to be a building year. With seven returning seniors - only two of whom are expected to start - and nine juniors, Percy is counting heavily on a talented group of young recruits. "We basically lost our entire offensive line and our whole offensive backfield is gone," Percy said. "We're going to be awfully young and a lot of those kids are going to have to step forward and play for us."

Coach Percy had an opportunity to evaluate his new squad during a pre-season scrimmage against Mid-America Nazarene on Saturday, September 5. "I thought our team performed exceptionally well," Percy commented, "considering the fact that we had only a week's practice and Mid-America had three. We were able to contain their offense and move the ball." Percy is excited about the enthusiasm of his new recruits and, as they gain experience, he feels they will become a competitive threat in the conference.

Coming off last year's 2-7 conference mark and 2-8 season overall, Ottawa took a beating in the pre-season media and coaches' polls which annually are taken in mid-August. The coaches tabbed OU to finish eighth in the conference and the media was even less kind - forecasting a gloomy ninth place finish for the Braves. Coach Percy, however, was not to be discouraged by the pre-season doomsayers: "I'm not disappointed because we've been toward the bottom of the poll since I've been here, and two of the three years we've gone out and tied for fourth place. Pre-season polls don't mean anything. What means something is what you do out on the grass on Saturday."

ASSISTANT COACHES

Pat Boeh, trying his hand at coaching for the first time, will assist with the defensive secondary. Boeh, a four-year veteran of the Braves' football team, was the 1986 recipient of the Dick Peters Memorial Award.

Carl Boldra, quarterback of the 1986 Braves' football team, will work with the offensive backs in this, his first coaching assignment.

Ron Gardner, now in his second year on the OU coaching staff, is the defensive coordinator and also coaches the defensive line. From 1964-74 he was defensive coordinator for Shawnee Mission East High School under then head coach Glenn Percy. He was head coach for seven years at Concordia High School and his latest coaching assignment was with Olathe South High School as defensive coordinator. He presently is a teacher at Olathe South.

Jim Grogan, a 1953 OU alumnus, is now in his 14th year on the OU coaching staff. Grogan, who coaches receivers and tight ends, was the defensive back coach for seven years at the University and also coaches in the Ottawa USD 290 school system. While at OU, Grogan was a four-year letterman. His wife, Doris, and son, Scott, are also alumni.

Brad O'Dea is no newcomer to Ottawa University football, now in his ninth year as an assistant coach working with the linebackers and defensive ends. A 1968 OU alumnus, O'Dea was All-Conference for three years, All-District for two years, and named All-American his senior year.


Mark Percy is now in his fourth year as defensive back coach. Previously he coached at Allen County Community College and Washburn University.
