A REMINDER TO ALL CHAPTERS

The Constitution of Pi Kappa Delta provides that any chapter failing to have a delegate at two consecutive National Conventions shall be placed on probation and that such probationary status can be lifted only by action of a National Convention.

In addition every new chapter failing to have a delegate at the first National Convention after the granting of its charter shall be placed on probation.

Attendance at a National Convention is defined by the Constitution as answering present to roll call at not less than two business sessions of the convention. One of these sessions must be the final session unless the chapter has been excused by the National President. If the Charter Committee can be of any assistance in helping schools get off probation or avoid going on probation, please do not hesitate to request help.

NATIONAL COUNCIL REPORTS

SUMMER MEETING

The National Council of Pi Kappa Delta met for the biennial summer business meeting at the King's Ransom Motel in Sedona, Arizona August 26-29, 1968. All ten members including students Jim Hite of Arizona State University and Ann Wallace of Fresno State College were present for the eight sessions beginning at 1:00 p.m. on Monday and ending at 6:00 p.m. Thursday on the campus of A.S.U. On Tuesday afternoon William Stites, Mary Day and Richard Keil came up from the campus at Tempe to discuss with the Council such subjects as housing, meals, and contest facilities. On Thursday afternoon the Council met with a representative of the Administration on the campus to work on some of the remaining problems. In addition to the consideration of many routine matters of business, the sessions were organized around a study of the suggestions which came to the Council by way of the 1967 Convention Evaluation Committee, recommendations made by the Governors, ideas coming from the Province Conventions, and the results of the questionnaire sent to chapter sponsors last spring.

The total membership at the end of the year July 31, 1968 was 42,095. The number of new members for the past year was 988. Sixty-one chapters advanced one or more members to the degree of Highest Distinction in 1967-68 as compared with fifty-one chapters in the previous year. Sixty-two chapters ordered a total of 223 keys for their members in the past year. This pattern has changed very little over the past five years. There is an increase in all key prices as of July 1, 1968.

The largest increase occurs on those keys involving emeralds and diamonds. A new buff color key order form with the new prices has replaced the yellow form in use last year. One form will be included in the annual Fall letter to chapters. Additional forms as well as other supplies may be ordered on the report form which is due

back in the national office not later than November 15, 1968. Some chapters are still sending in membership applications with too few contests recorded. The minimum requirements for all degrees were raised at the 1967 Convention and appear in the October 1967 Forensic as well as in the newly revised constitution. Of course, the complete records of applicants for membership should be recorded on the application form.

Province Coordinator, Les Lawrence reported on communications with the Governors involving a three point program designed to establish a more effective relationship with all parts of the organization. Specific information will be sent to the Governors this fall in regard to the present status of chapters in each Province. Past President and Convention Chairman for 1969, Georgia Bowman, reported on the work being done to revise the Governors Manual, the work of the National Questions Committee and the plans for the coming Convention. Gilbert Rau, Editor of the Forensic, reviewed the trials and frustrations of a first year Editor with suggestions for alleviating some of the problems for the coming year. The Council approved the bid of Ford Press to print the Forensic for the year 1968-69. The Council also reaffirmed the policy of Pi Kappa Delta that all elective and appointive officers shall be affiliated with Pi Kappa Delta member schools. James Grissinger's report for the Constitutional Revision Committee indicated that, up to the present time, the comments received relate only to minor changes to clarify wording. Fred Goodwin, Chairman of the Charter and Standards Committee, reported on the status of new chapters. During the past year thirty-one schools have expressed an interest in forming a chapter. About half that number have made application, of which ten have been approved, three rejected and a few are still in process of completing application proced-

ures. President Ted Karl announced that the annual informal meeting of Pi Kappa Delta members held at the time of the Speech Association of America Convention in Chicago would be on Saturday evening December 28, 1968 from 5:15 to 7:00 p.m. The Secretary was requested to include a reminder in the fall letter to sponsors. Georgia Bowman submitted her resignation from the National Debate and Discussion Committee and Fred Goodwin was appointed to this committee. The President then appointed Past President Bowman as Chairman of the Public Relations and Research Committee.

All suggestions made by the 1967 Convention Evaluation Committee were introduced for discussion by H. Francis Short, Contest Chairman, and by Ann Wallace and Jim Hite. The student members presented plans for student meetings and recreation. Appointments were made to the Convention Contest Committees. The complete listing of committee personnel will appear in the January Forensic following confirmation of appointments.

Suggested extempore speaking topics will be submitted to the chapters for a preferential vote by way of the annual fall letter from the Secretary. The first place topic will be announced at the meeting on December 28th and in the January Forensic. Plans will be made to get the January Forensic in the mail early in January.

Following are a few of the Council actions which should be of interest to members at this early date. Details of all convention and contest rules will appear in the January Forensic. In reference to new chapters, it was reaffirmed that petitioning chapters must have their charter and membership fees in the National Office by Dec. 1, 1968 and must be installed by Feb. 1, 1969 in order to participate in the 1969 contests at Tempe. No charter will be presented at Tempe unless all requirements have been met, including installation. Chapters which have not completed all requirements may be invited as observers.

Housing for 700 persons, 175 rooms with

four to a room, has been reserved at the Ramada at the rate of \$3.25 per person plus 5% tax. If there are only three, or two, or one to a room, the price will be higher and the total cost per individual will be more than the package price of \$38.00. Also, it may be necessary to place persons desiring a single, double or triple in a motel other than the Ramada. The Ramada is not within walking distance of the campus. Plans call for special busses to go from the Ramada to the campus in the morning and return in the evening. Public bus trans-

portation is also available.

There will be a Championship Division of Debate. It will be open (men, women, or mixed), cross examination Oregon style (8, 3, 4, each speaker having a rebuttal). Only one team per chapter shall be entered in this division. There will be eight rounds for all teams with hidden quarter and semifinals in rounds seven and eight. These eight rounds will count toward sweepstakes. The final championship debate between the top two teams will not count toward sweepstakes. To qualify for the Championship Division, each debater shall be required to have won 60% of his tournament debates in the academic year 1968-69 and shall have participation in a minimum of 10 rounds of tournament debate. There will be a division of Traditional Debate in which a chapter may enter a maximum of two teams. This division shall be open (men, women, or mixed). Thus, each chapter shall be allowed a maximum of three debate teams. Oratory, Extempore Speaking and Discussion will be open (men, women, or mixed) and each chapter limited to two entries in each event. Each chapter will be limited to one entry in Interpretation (man or woman).

The National Secretary will mail an entry form to each chapter sponsor on or about the first of February 1969 and the entries must be mailed to the Secretary so as to show a postmark not later than February 28, 1969. Come to the 1969 Pi Kappa Delta Convention which will be held at Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona, March

31 - April 4.
