

# IN A DEBATE HERE

**Strong Gustavus Adolphus Team Against O. U. Wednesday Night; Team Is Home from Trip**

Prof. Evan A. Reiff and four Ottawa University debaters returned late Saturday from a week's trip through Missouri and Iowa where they met 10 other college debate teams. The Ottawa debaters who made the trip were Norman Godbey, Wilbur Swenson, Chester Fleming and Paul Whitaker.

Decision debates were held with five schools and non-decision discussions were with the other five. At Missouri Valley college in Marshall, Mo., the Ottawans lost the judges decision but won the vote of the audience. At Central in Fayette, Mo., the Ottawans debated to a draw. They lost a decision to Iowa Wesleyan at Mt. Pleasant. John Fletcher College at Oskaloosa, Iowa, won an audience decision over the Ottawans. The non-decision contests were held with Parsons College, Central College, Simpson College, Cornell College and Coe College, in Iowa.

Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock the Ottawans will have a decision debate with Gustavus Adolphus college in the administration building. Chester Fleming and Wilbur Swenson will debate the negative side of the current question for O. U., "Resolved that congress should be empowered to fix minimum hours and maximum wages in industry." The public is invited to attend this debate. Gustavus Adolphus College, located at St. Peter, Minnesota, is rated as having one of the 10 best debate teams by Pi Kappa Delta, national forensic fraternity.

**O. U. Meets Bethany, O. H. S. Plays K. C. Manual in Double Bill Here Tomorrow Night.**

The Ottawa University and Ottawa high school basketball teams will participate tomorrow evening in the last doubleheader bargain entertainment of the current season. The high school will meet Manual from Kansas City, Mo., in the curtain raiser at 7:30 and the university will meet Bethany College in a Kansas conference go at about 8:45.

Coach Dick Godlove's boys have a chance to boost their conference record to an even 500 per cent if they register a victory. But Bethany will have a serious threat in their tall center, Maupin, working under the basket. In the last game between the two schools it took hard playing by Bill Mattis to stop this man's scoring threats. Brenton got off to a poor stride against Maupin. The team, however, was fairly worn out from the stiff Kansas Wesleyan game the previous night, managing to win 34 to 25 by virtue of a lead piled up early in the game.

Advance dope in the high school end of the two-way bill is strikingly similar to that in last week's Emporia high contest. If Coach Bill Kincaid's Cyclones can maintain the mad pace they set in their upset conference win they'll stand at least an even chance against the Kansas City outfit. Like Emporia, Manual, averaging 5 feet, 9 inches, will have a decided advantage in height but is described as a quintet of only medium speed. Also like Emporia, the Kansas Citians have suffered but one defeat. That was to Paseo high in an interscholastic league game.

Manual holds victories over Rosedale, Leavenworth, Pembroke, Westport and Southwest. It hasn't as yet met East high, trounced decisively by the Cyclones. The Kansas Citians are missing the services of Joe Cirrione, an all-star for two years, who graduated at the end of the term. A probable starting lineup for Manual is announced as Gene Di Bella and Bob Sears, forwards; Jack Northrop, center; Jack Rufe and Roy Johnson, guards.

Tickets for the game are on sale at the North American coffee shop. There is no advance in prices. The reserved seats are 40 cents.

Adrian Miller carried the burden of the Ottawa battle during the first part of the game but was forced to slow down when Referee John Wulf called the third foul on him during the latter part of the first half. It was Miller's free tossing and shooting which kept the Braves pulling along during the fore part of the game. He was aided by Pennington who dropped in a pair of goals in the same period.

The O. U. players missed several nice shots, but the flaw in their play was failure to get the ball off the backboard and to pass it accurately. Rockhurst had the ball at least two-thirds of the game.

In a preliminary the Rockhurst Reserves rallied late in the game and defeated the Ottawa Reserves 30 to 20.

**WAGED HARD BATTLE**

**O. U. Lost to C. of E. But Gave Presbies Plenty To Do on Home Court.**

The Ottawa University basketball team invaded Emporia last night and lost a Kansas conference game to College of Emporia, 30 to 41, but not before they waged as hard a battle as has been played on the Presby crack-crack box court in a long while.

Midway of the last period the Emporians pulled away to a 13-point lead which seemed safe but not certain. As it proved it was not safe, for the Braves with Pennington, Swetnam and Morgan hitting in rapid succession ran the score up to 25 to 31 in less than a minute and a half. Swetnam closed the gap a bit further with a free throw and then the Presbyterians took advantage of their own court and plied their way to a substantial lead as the game came to a close.

It was one of those games almost savagely played. It was a rough-and-tumble affair with plenty of red-blooded action that several times almost went beyond the bounds of basketball. Someone has said that the small Emporia court is more like a boxing ring than a basketball court. The close play last night displayed a lot of body contact. Lee of Emporia and Brenton of Ottawa went out of the game early in the second period on fouls and several others were hanging on by an edge when the game ended. The Braves could not find the

**ON A SCORING SPREE**

**O. U. Braves Defeated Bethany, 42 to 17—Locals Played a High Type Game.**

The Ottawa University basketball team found a magnet in the basket last night and defeated Bethany College, 42 to 17, in a Kansas conference game on the junior high court. The victory left them in a tie with McPherson for third place, the latter having defeated Salina Wesleyan last night.

Lyman Morgan set off the explosion with a neat overhead shot made from a screen play in front of the basket. During most of the rest of the half the Ottawans kept a steady plugging at the basket. Omer Brenton and Adrian Miller joined forces with Morgan to run the score up to 25 to 5 at the half. Coach Dick Godlove moved most of his first string out in the latter part of the first period, but reinserted them to play about 10 minutes in the second half, just by way of making sure of the game.

The Braves' plays were clicking and several times they moved in on the basket in perfect formation to score on easy shots. Their fast breaks were executed for the most part with a great deal of finish, short passing under the basket at the conclusion of these breaks being spectacular at times. The locals did a nice job of getting the ball off the backboard most of the time. Maupin and Warren, however, in the second half helped the Swedes to rebound more effectively. These Bethany players showed considerable promise.

Lyle Swetnam broke in from his guard position three times to score. Harding went in once to score a handy basket. Lyman Morgan was high with 14 points. Brenton trailed him closely, scoring 13.

Monday the Braves go to Emporia for a game against the conference-leading College of Emporia.

Braves Pull Up in Last Five Minutes To Defeat McPherson 26 to 22.

McPherson, Kas., Feb. 20.—(AP)—A late scoring spree gave Ottawa University a 26-22 Kansas conference basketball victory last night over McPherson College. The game was close throughout and the lead changed five times.

Ottawa took an early lead but the Bulldogs soon passed the Braves by two points. At half time, Ottawa led, 15 to 14. McPherson went into a 19 to 15 lead shortly after the second period opened. Ottawa soon tied the score again at 21 to 21.

The visitors then rallied and gained a 26 to 21 lead with a minute left to play. Robertson scored a free throw shortly before the game ended.

Miller came through with a nice field goal to duplicate his feat in a previous game and seal up the game. The two Morgan brothers tossed in charity tosses near the end of the battle. By virtue of Brenton's last minute goal, Ottawa led at the half. McPherson opened the second half by jumping into a 6-point lead, but steady plugging from the free throw line finally brought the Ottawans within hailing distance of the straining Bull Dogs. L. Morgan dropped in a neat goal to tie the score at 21 all and then Miller flashed up to score the winning points. He was high point man with eight points. The Braves will play Sterling tonight.

They held the fast stepping McPherson team to 22 points, the lowest score the Bulldogs have made this season.

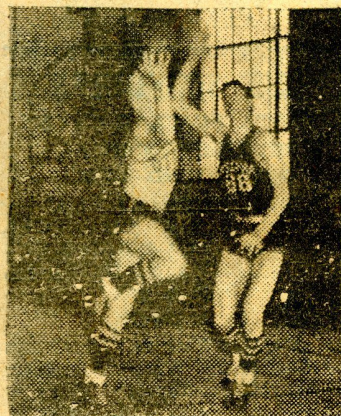
Here Lyman Morgan (with the ball) and Adrian Miller are demonstrating how a pivot shot is made under the basket.
