

SUBSTITUTE TURNED TIDE

After An Even First Half, St. Benedict's Beat O. U.

St. Benedict's beat Ottawa University, 39 to 29, by the sterling work of a substitute center who went into the game the last half and caged six baskets and a free throw. Maher was his name. According to Larry Mullins, St. Benedict's coach, it was the hottest the Ravens have been all season.

It was quite a ball game if one forgets about the first 10 minutes of the second half. The Ravens scored 20 points in that time while the Braves were remaining scoreless.

The game started off with both teams doing nice passing and with the Braves doing fancy basket missing. Several times the Braves were unable to connect with set-ups. And that is the way it was all evening, the local boys could not get the range of the basket. Only Daylight could hit and he got five nice shots, most of them long ones that swished through the net with ease. The first half was close all the way with St. Benedict's pulling up to a 14 to 13 lead at the halfway mark.

In the absence of Coach Dee Erickson, who is confined to his home with a severe cold, Berry Dillon had charge of the Braves and did a smart job in running the team. Adrean Miller, center for the Braves, was unable to play due to a sprained wrist.

Saturday night the College of Emporia team comes to Ottawa for the last game of the season to be played here. By that time Coach Erickson and Miller should be ready for duty and the Braves in better shape to take on their conference foe. Tickets for the game are on sale at the North American hotel coffee shop. The game will start at 9:15 to permit merchants to attend.

In a preliminary the O. U. freshmen defeated the intramural all-stars 43 to 27.

O. U. Braves Priming for C. of E. Here Saturday Night.

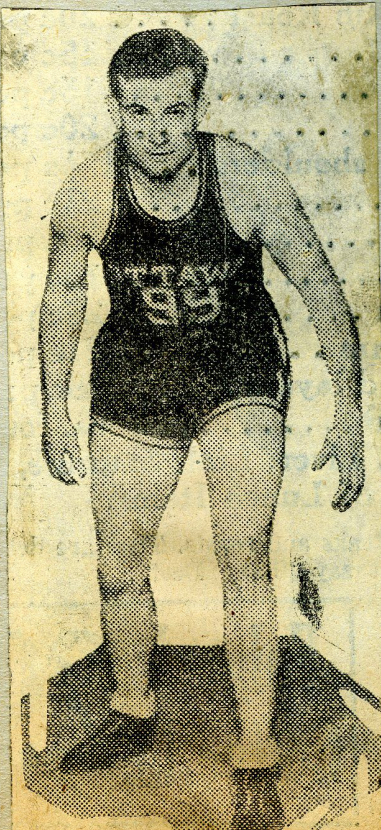

IN LAST HOME GAME

Barker, Pett, Daylight and Mullen Play Tomorrow Night.

Tomorrow night when the Ottawa University Braves step on the junior high school basketball court at 9:15 against College of Emporia, four of them will be playing their last home game. They are Gerald Barker, Allan Pett, Clarence Daylight and Hugh Mullen.

These boys have furnished the fans with many a thrill. For eight years Gerald Barker, an Ottawa boy, has been leveling off at the basket for Ottawa high school and Ottawa University. He has scored many points during that time and has helped to win a lot of ball games for both schools. Fans looking at the scoreboard to find an Ottawa team trailing have looked down at Barker and said, "Barker will come through now in a minute." And quite often he did just that at the crucial moment. Take the last Baker game a year ago for instance O U. needed a victory to win the conference crown but was trailing by 10 points and the game was slipping along toward the end. "Cut loose, Barker!" some fan pleaded and the big boy did with a terrific onslaught on the basket. He scored 11 points in less than 3 minutes, demoralized the Baker team and Ottawa went on to win. Barker has led the conference in scoring for three years and is near the top this season. He has placed on the all-conference team and on the all-state team as well. He has been a great player properly recognized as such.

Allan Pett of Topeka for three years has been an important cog in the team and a powerful asset as a guard. His clinging defensive ability has held powerful scorers down to a nubbin. Tomorrow night he will be displaying his wares for the last time on an Ottawa court.

OTTAWA'S LAST HOME GAME.

College of Emporia Is the Braves' Opponent Tonight.

OTTAWA, KAS., Feb. 21.—The Ottawa university Braves play their last home basket ball game of the season tomorrow night when they meet the College of Emporia team in a Kansas conference contest. In the first encounter in Emporia, C. of E. defeated Ottawa, 44 to 36. If Ottawa succeeds in downing Emporia, it will give Kansas Wesleyan a better chance to nose out Emporia for third place in the Kansas conference.

Four seniors—Gerald Barker, Allan Pett, Clarence Daylight and Hugh Mullen—are all ready to suit up for their last home appearance and each is hoping this will be one of the best games that he has played.

O. U. would like to win the game so that its standing in the conference will be boosted and so would the Emporia Presbies. They are a fighting bunch, well able to match attack for attack with the driving Braves. The young Ottawans in the lineup this season are certainly not lacking in fight which is a good indication for the team next year. Tonight these youngsters will be matching veterans stride for stride.

Barker and Daylight may be hitting the basket freely tonight. They are both due for some heavy scoring. Barker is leading the Kansas conference by a fraction of a point in the scoring and should he sink quite a few tonight he might put himself in line for leadership in the conference for four straight years.

BRAVES LOST TO C. OF E.

Visitors, Paced by Rock, Won Saturday Night.

The Ottawa University Braves met defeat at the hands of the College of Emporia basketball team, 37 to 44, in their last home game, Saturday night on the junior high court. Ottawa took a 7 to 2 lead in the first four minutes of play, but Rock of C. of E. caged three buckets in quick succession to take the lead for Emporia. During the first half the lead changed hands several times, but at the end of the period C. of E. was leading 22 to 18. After the rest period Lee and Rock of Emporia made counters that brought the fighting Presbyterians' score up to 35 while the Braves were trailing by eight points. However, goals by Daylight and Allard and two free throws by Barker brought the Braves within two points of C. of E. With but four minutes left to play, the Emporia quintet drew away from Ottawa and cinched the game.

Barker, Pett and Daylight played their last home game for Ottawa. Barker was unable to find the basket although he did sink 7 free throws. Daylight played a good game, sinking two of the long "swisher" shots for which he has become well known. Allan Pett played his usual fine defensive game. Rock of Emporia was the hot shot of the evening, caging 7 field goals and 4 free throws. Both teams played a tight defensive game, but there were times when the ball went from one end of the court to the other as the teams tried and missed setups. Harding had a good eye for the basket and as a result scored 4 field goals for Ottawa. Lynch played a fast, smooth floor game beside scoring 2 field goals.

The Braves meet Haskell at Lawrence next Wednesday and go to Baldwin March 4 to play the Baker five.

OTTAWA U. WINS, 19-17

Late Goal by Joe Lynch Defeats Haskell Indians.

Lawrence, Kan., Feb. 26.—(A. P.)—Ottawa university's basket ball team nosed out Haskell, 19 to 17, tonight, a long shot from the side by Joe Lynch, Ottawa forward, proving the deciding basket. The score was tied 7-all at the half. Haskell took a lead at the start of the second period.

WON A TENSE GAME

Lynch's Long Shot at Finish Gave O. U. Victory Over Haskell.

With 27 seconds to go, Joe Lynch flipped in a long goal and permitted Ottawa University to defeat Haskell 19 to 17 in a tightly played defensive game at Lawrence last night.

It was a roughly played game. Gerald Barker went out of the game early in the second half and Clarence Daylight followed a few minutes later when he sustained a hip injury. Nine of the Braves' 19 points came from free throws and three of the Indians' points were won that way.

The game started off slowly with neither team taking chances. After 12 minutes of ball passing Ottawa had a 7 to 2 lead, but about that time the Indians showed signs of a sweeping rally and pulled up to a 7 to 7 tie before the Ottawans could haul them down. That is the way the half ended.

The Indians put on a flashy rally at the beginning of the second period and piled up a 4-point lead but that melted away on a goal by Barker and a pair of free throws by Miller and Daylight. Ottawa went ahead a few minutes later on a goal by Lynch to be overhauled and passed by the Indians. Then Miller got a free throw to tie the score and for a few minutes the ball churned back and forth with both teams shooting. Joe Lynch finally got open in the last half minute and dropped in a fairly long shot to get the necessary victory margin. That lead held up in the last few seconds but there was some plain and fancy ball scrambling, with five Indians driving and diving.

It was the first game the Ottawans have won on the Haskell court in several years and they did it by holding down the game.

Next Wednesday Ottawa closes the season in a game with Baker at Baldwin.

Haskell Renews Rivalry With Brave Footballers September 25.

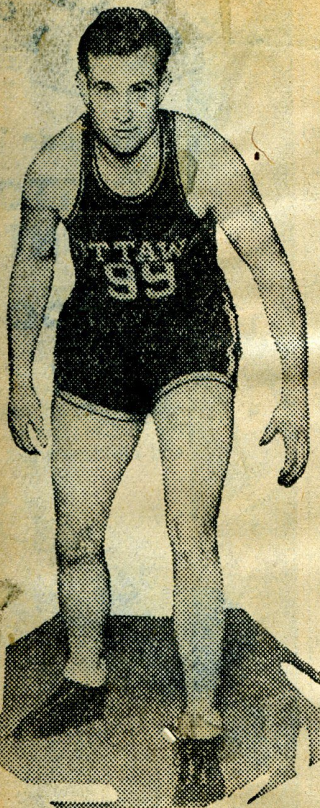

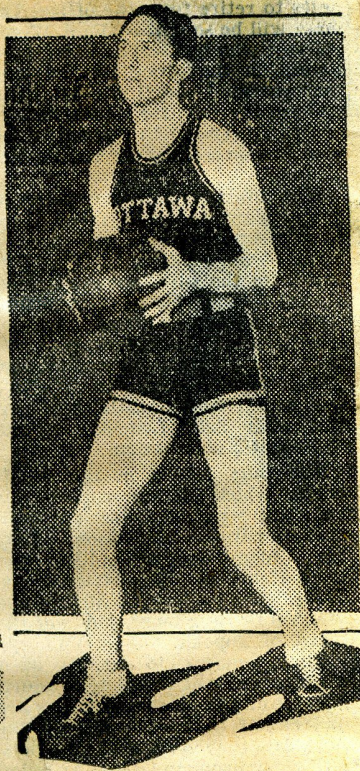

Kansas City, March 2.—(AP)—Baker ends its Kansas conference basketball season in a game with Ottawa Wednesday night at Baldwin. Should Baker win, which is probable, McPherson must defeat Kansas Wesleyan Tuesday and College of Emporia Friday to tie for the crown.

Baker, heavy favorite to take the Kansas conference crown, found its path blocked by McPherson last week. McPherson turned in a 30 to 24 victory with a great second-period rally, and went into a temporary tie for first place. Baker, however, came back to defeat College of Emporia 50 to 35, and take an approximate half-game lead.

Kansas Wesleyan did not engage in a conference game last week, but through the defeat of College of Emporia jumped from fourth to a tie for third with the Emporia quintet.

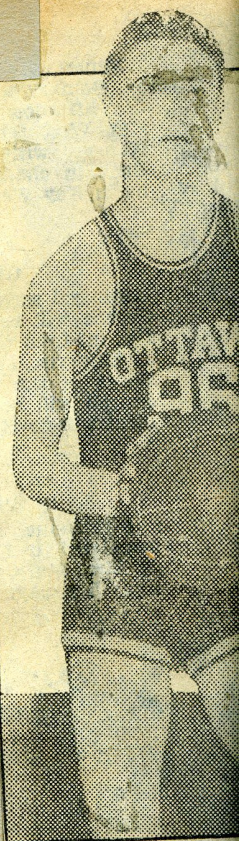
In the C. I. C. Fort Hays State and Southwestern go into the home stretch virtually neck and neck.

Fort Hays is leading the C. I. C. by approximately half a game, and the Tigers have two more games—both with Pittsburg this week—on their schedule. Baldwin, Kan., March 3.—(Special)—Having defeated College of Emporia by a 50 to 35 score last Saturday night, the Baker University Wildcats for the time being have undisputed possession of first place in the Kansas conference, but the Bakerites are face to face with a three-horn dilemma.

BAKER TAKES TITLE

O. U. No Match for Inspired Baker Team Last Night.

Baker University defeated Ottawa University last night 42 to 21 at Baldwin and thereby won its first Kansas conference championship since nobody seems to know when—at least 10 or 15 years. They deserved to win it last night.

After playing a weak first half, the Ottawans came back in the second to make quite a ball game. The veteran Schrey scored 22 points for the Wildcats. He was burning up from the start to the finish, sticking the ball in from all angles.

It was Schrey's scoring and Albertson's and Heine's floor play which won the game. The former, playing his last game for Baker, flipped around the court playing a stellar defensive and offensive game. The big Heine was a power on defense, especially under the basket, and out on the court he was like a big unwinding spinning-wheel, effective even though he did waste a tremendous amount of energy.

Ottawa simply could not put the ball through the hoop in the first half, missing shot after shot, but in the second the Braves came back to play on more even terms.

It was the last college game for four Ottawans, Barker, Pett, Daylight and Mullen. They played well though up against an inspired championship-bent team. Joe Lynch battling the Wildcats all over the court made the Ottawa fans glad that he has two more years in which to make basketball history for O. U.
