There are two subjects that deserve the careful consideration of your Board. 1st The present condition of the school 2^d its needs. We take pleasure in commending the work which has been done by our teachers. As far as we have been able to judge, those who have been in charge of the school have applied their best energies in the interests of those who have been under their care. The instruction given has been competent and thorough. It is believed that the teachers are entitled to great credit for the interest which they have manifested in their several departments. The progress of the students seems to have been all that could be reasonably expected. It is needless to say perhaps that the teachers have labored under great disadvantages and discouragements, the school being small, the appliances few and their pay far in arrears. The statistics of attendance &c will be found in the report of Prof. Stewart 2^d As to its needs. The school during the past year has been small. The principal cause will probably be found in the fewness of teachers and of advantages offered. It is the opinion of the Board of Directors that one of the greatest needs of the school is an enlarged faculty.

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
