

Barnyard Babies: Integrating Agriculture in the Classroom

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Course Description: Are you looking for ways to integrate subject areas? Do you wish there was a topic/theme that was broad enough to cover multiple curricular areas in one unit? Well, look no further. This course will encourage you to explore ways to bring agriculture into your classroom in all subject areas. We'll be visiting the Barnyard Babies Festival at the National Agricultural Center and Hall of Fame in Bonner Springs, KS on Saturday. On Sunday we'll join together to brainstorm ways to bring agricultural experiences into your classroom. Whether you're interested in farm animals, crops, agricultural history, farm equipment, or environmental issues, the ways to incorporate agricultural topics are endless. Because all grade levels have standards related to nutrition, history, life sciences, and environmental stewardship, this course is open to all.

This course will meet at the The National Agricultural Center and Hall of Fame in Bonner Springs, KS.

COURSE FORMAT

This course will be offered as a choice of the following formats:

- 1. <u>In-Person</u>: Attend both Saturday (10:00-??) at the National Ag Hall of Fame and Sunday (9:00-3:00) at the Ottawa Kansas City campus and complete the syllabus assignments by the end of the entire course.
- 2. <u>Online Format</u>: Attend a Zoom call (optional) on Saturday at 8:00 am to answer any questions you have. Complete the syllabus assignments by the end of the entire course. Complete 2 small attendance assignments and submit by the end of the entire course.
- 3. <u>Blended:</u> Attend one of the days and complete the syllabus assignments by the end of the entire course. Complete 1 small attendance assignment and submit by the end of the entire course.
- * After you enroll, the instructor will email you for your choice.
- * If you choose online and want the Zoom call, the instructor will email you the Zoom Link and the extra assignment(s).

- 3. Explore community resources that are ag-related and how to bring them into the classroom.
- 4. Describe the Pillars of Agricultural Literacy, why they're important, and how they can be used in lesson development.

She has a BA in Elementary Education and Special Education and an MS in Curriculum Development with an emphasis on Reading and Language Arts. She is a recipient of the Presidential Award for Excellence in Math and Science Teaching, and she is currently Olathe's Elementary Teacher of the Year. Outside of the classroom, she and her husband, Cliff, have 5 grown sons and 2 daughters-in-law.

Agricultural Resources

Worth 50 pts.


Compile a list of at least 20 new (or new to you) agricultural resources. This can be videos, websites, children's books, props, field trip ideas, virtual field trips, etc.

Include the web address, title of resource, type of resource, and a short blurb about how you would like to use this resource.

Lesson Plan

Worth 100 pts.

- -Submit a lesson plan template of your choice OR write your plans for a lesson in paragraph form.
- -This lesson can be one that you currently present to students or one that is new to you.
- -The lesson should include at least 2 concepts from the 6 Pillars of Agricultural Literacy.
- -The lesson should include an agricultural non-fiction selection.
- -List and define any agricultural terms that you'll be using during the lesson.
- -Can you include any background information from a commodity? (ie: corn, soybeans, beef council, pork producers, cotton, sorghum, wheat, etc.)



Pillars of Agricultural Literacy

Worth 100 pts.

Type a 1-2 page paper (double-spaced, Times New Roman size 12 font) that covers the following:

- 1. Definition of Agricultural Literacy
- 2. List and provide examples of the 6 Pillars of Agricultural Literacy
- 3. What areas of your curriculum and standards can you include agricultural topics/concept in?
- 4. What is meant by Farm-To-Table and what does that mean for your students?
- 5. Agriculture is predicted to play an even bigger role in the future of our students. Why do you think this is? What career choices are available to students in the agricultural field besides being a farmer?

Course Reflection

Worth 10 pts

At the end of the course, submit a reflection of the course that is about a paragraph in length. This reflection can be on things you learned, things you wished you'd learned, how you'll use this info. in your classroom, etc.
