President Smith: -

Permit me to present herewith a brief report of the Summer Session 1925. Prior to this session the college of arts and sciences had not offered summer study as an institution. In 1923 and again in 1924 four members of the college faculty presented courses which were fully accredited by the college. The regular college equipment was employed by these members and a certain percentage of the tuition was turned over to the college but the institution assumed no financial or other obligation in the conduct of the work.

In 1925 the Summer Session was organized as a regular enterprise of the college. A faculty was employed on a guaranted basis, a fine bulletin of the summer session was issued, and other means employed to give the work prominence. At this time the college assumed full responsibility for the work, financial, academic and otherwise. A nine weeks term was arranged and conducted extending from June 4 to August 1. By employing a six day a week schedule, nine weeks work was presented in eight weeks.

Miss Bernice Settles was endorsed as a special tutor in Modern Language paying the Summer Session a percentage of her fees for the use of the college equipment.

There were eighty three (83) students Cnrolled who went through and earned credits.

The work of this session proved to be very pleasant in spite of the heat of summer. The schedule was arranged so that no afternoon work was required in the class rooms or laboratories. Thus the afternoons were given over to study or recreation. The swimming pool and tennis courts offered opportunity for diversion and exercise. One regular all school social event was enjoyed as a means of getting student body and faculty better acquainted. One chapel assembly a week was convened at which time was presented a series of lectures and musical recitals much enjoyed by all.
