## Alumni Giving Zooms Upward

Grads Give \$21,167 to Current Fund for 29 Per Cent. Class of 1920 Leads Parade of Contributors

A new record in current fund giving was set by alumni in 1958–59. Led by a committee with Wilbur Wheaton, '54, as chairman, alumni posted a total of \$21,167. That is far ahead of the total of \$13,126 last year.

Twenty-nine per cent of alumni gave as compared to 18 per cent a year ago.

The increase in a single year was 52 per cent in numbers, 61 per cent in amount.

Wheaton and Robert Schendel, president of the Association in 1958– 59, Eldon Addy, '37, a member of the committee and 1959–60 chairman, were pleased with the results.

"We can do much better," said Addy. "Fifty to 70 per cent should be contributing. Maybe next year more will catch the spirit."

All agreed to that.

Why the increase this year?

The classes in competing for the David Blair trophy were also instrumental in raising the totals. A new system of figuring the rank gave the large classes a chance. The simple formula is the number of givers plus the percentage of givers.

The Class of 1920 with a ranking of 80 topped the list. 1916 with 78 was second, 1909 with 77 third, 1912 with 75 fourth. The young class of 1958 made a great showing with a 72 ranking, the only class of the last 21 to earn a place in the top 10.

Classes with 10 or less members were not ranked in the list. Thus the classes from 1893 through 1903 were not placed in the ranking list. Rather, the committee thought to rate that group separately. Here they are:

Committee members give credit to the Anchor-Chain people who called on so many alumni last year. Half of the far-flung Ottawans were reached by visit or telephone.

In Wichita 39 of 73 alumni, 53 per cent. made contributions as a result of the Anchor-Chain calling. In Scott County, Kans., four of four for 100 per cent. In Shawnee county, the home of President Schendel 34 of 54 gave for a total of 63 per cent.

Outside of Kansas the top was Alabama with 3 of 3 for 100 per cent. Pennsylvania with 16 of 24 had 67 per cent. South Dakota was 63 per cent. New Jersey was 52, Nebraska 39, Michigan 39, Maryland 38, and so down the list.
