



EDU 50012-KA, Balance Work and Life (2 Credit Hours)

Prior to the pandemic educators often struggled to find enough hours in the day. Supporting the social and emotional needs of students is a focus of all school districts. But, to support students, staff members must also be able to take care of themselves. Instructor Bio

Course Objectives:

1. Participants will be introduced to a variety of resources to help provide balance between "work and life".
2. Participants will collaborate and identify the barriers that many educators face when trying to support the needs of all students plus taking care of themselves.

- Participants will review and reflect on a variety of topics and create two reflective journal entries related to their “work-life” balance planning process.

Course Methods and Procedures:

As indicated above, this class will be presented in a blended learning model. One day of an interactive format in an online meeting with all class participants and follow-up activities and reflections completed through blackboard.

Assignment Descriptions

Reflective Journal - During the in-person component of the class, participants will review / discuss a variety of resources related to the challenges educators face in reaching “balance” between work and life responsibilities. Each participant will then select two topics to review in more detail and submit two reflective journal entries (no more than 500 words per reflection).

Online students should also follow this expectation beyond the time he/she spends interacting within the online course .
