D. J. NABORS CALLS FOR WIGOROUS P. R. POLICY FOR "55=6"

Keynoting the second business session of the week's activities, National Secretary-Treasurer D. J. Nabors of East Central State College, Ada, Okla., delivered the "State of the Fraternity" nessage, highlighting the exceptional growth of PKD so far this year, and the continuing need for a vigorous, public relations program.

"Pi Kappa Delta is federation that operates on three levels, the local chapters, the provincial areas, and the national organization. At all three levels we need a sound program that we can be proud of, that we can justify on the bases of recent trends of the modern philosophy of education and the teaching of speech. Having developed such a program we should not put our candle under a bushel, but in its rightful place to continue to light the way for others in speech education," the Secretary stated.

Comparing this years growth of 440 members so far to the total growth of 740 in 1954, Nabors said that Pi Kappa Delta "is in sounder condition now than for several years."

Part of this growth he attributed to the convention which brought as kigh as 40% new members as delegates to the convention.

Outlining the past year's public relations activities, Nabors showed expenditures for 3,000 calendar cards which were distributed through the chapters, and letters to the Gollege Presidents in Pi Kappa Delta schools.

In writing to the heads of the schools where PKD has chapters, telling about that local chapter's activities, the national officer said he had received over 100 replies, and was very pleased with the results in increased allotments, and the reception emeng administrations who are Pi Kap members.

In following programs of this kind through the future year, D. J. Nabors expects to continue the vigor and growth displayed here.
