

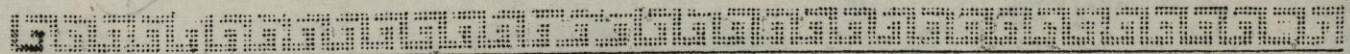

NUCLEAR DISPLAY

We are very privileged to have obtained the United States Army exhibit from Alexandria, Virginia on Nuclear Power for Peacetime Purposes. This exhibit was brought in yesterday and will be in the Grand Ballroom until Friday morning. From here it moves to Fort Bragg, North Carolina. According to Sergeant Fred Armstrong, the unit is sent out on request only, always working from the Cameron Station in Alexandria, Virginia.

The exhibit includes, with lighting, vivid color and sound affects, a demonstration of the value of uranium to be used as power to produce electricity. There are, at present, three stations, one in Utah, one in Fort Belvoir, Virginia, and the other

WELCOME TO BOWLING GREEN

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In Fort Greely, Alaska. According to Sergeant Waggy, the station in Fort Belvoir, Virginia, has been running for 2½ years on 50 pounds of uranium, which in the future (approx. 10 years) will be many times less expensive than an equal supply of oil or coal used as fuel.

At least two of the men will be on duty from 11-1:30 and from 5-7 everyday. Three of the men, Sgts. Ray Waggy, Lloyd Gormez, and Donald Quimby, are with the 101st Airborne Division. This display features old editions, including a page from the Koran, done in 1327, several first editions of famous books, and some signed editions, including the signatures of Carl Sandburg and Aldous Huxley.
