Pi Kappa Delta's Distinguished Alum.

This convention honors Raymond Miller, 59th Pi Kappa Delta member, as this year's distinguished alum. "I made three fortunes and lost two fortunes," said Miller. Miller defined fortunes for this reporter as many millions of dollars. In 1921 this red tie millionaire lost his first fortune. December 15, 1937 our alum walked away from the 28th dry oil well with his wife, two quarters, a Scottie dog, and the clothes on their backs. Since then Miller, who holds three honorary doctorate degrees, made his third fortune, participates on 21 boards, chairs eleven financial boards, helps run the Oakland Park system, advises three colleges financially, entertains thousands of guests at his home (10,124 so far), plays with politics, lectures to audiences (10,000 plus speeches), trains salesmen (20,000), makes millionaires (his top two trainees are worth \$700 million each), collects horses (Horseman of the year in 1966 in California), gathers red ties (his trademark which is known in 62 countries), and hunts big game in his spare time. This 75 year young alum said, "I have been throughly successful in my life, and I attribute a great part of that to the work done in debate. One has to have the ability to get up before an audience without any fear and with firmness. No matter how much one knows, it is completely useless unless one can express himself before an audience. Forensic activity helps a person to learn this ability."
