

STUDENTS ON NATIONAL COUNCIL

Pictured on the front cover of our convention program are Karen Marshall and John Cliff -- student membrs of the Pi Kap National Council.

These student legislators are serving two-year terms as full voting members. They helped plan this convention and will conduct the student meetings here (which continue to 8:30 p.m.). John was selected from the host university (UH) and Karen represents the host province (Lower Mississippi).

Karen Marshall is a 21year old Oklahoma State University senior from Seminole, Okla. A speech major, she debated in high school, has been on the O.S.U. squad four years and is the Oklahoma Alpha chapter president.

She has to leave the convention Tuesday night to return to her practice teaching in Tulsa. (A proxy representative for Karen will be elected by her Province tomorrow.) Karen explained: "Not only is my supervising teacher unsympathetic to Pi Kap, but she claims high school debaters (mine) can't handle a comparative advantages case!"

Next year Karen plans to begin graduate work in interpersonal communication at Purdue. She feels this field can offer forensic students a needed broadening or reaching out — "We often aren't in touch with people and issues outside our circle."

John Cliff, who will be 22 on Thursday, is also a senior with four years of collegiate debate behind him. He's a political science major. John and his partner won the 1969 Pi Kap cross-examination debate competition; this year he has been selected at large for the National Debate Tournament. He is also his chapter's president. He works at the UH law library and plans to enter law school next year. "My debate training and experience will help me in three particular ways in my future law career: 1. knowing how to select issues from rhetoric;

2. organizing material efficiently; 3. thinking on my feet."

Regarding the role of students in the fraternity's governance, Karen does not believe students should make policy, but she feels strongly that they should contact their Mational Council representatives so it can know what the students want and what their reactions are to policy decisions. She also suggests coaches can help students keep involved in Pi Kap.

John feels students have an effective voice through their meetings and representatives on the Council. He opposes the idea of having a student as president of Pi Kap or a student as a permanent Council member. But he does recommend that an at-large student representative replace or be added to the current student Council membership. This new member would be elected at the National and serve for two years, John said.

Both Karen and John see student apathy as the main detriment to Pi Kap. "If you want a relevant fraternity, help us make it so. We are in the right position. The Council listens to us. And often uses our suggestions. . .

CONVINTION SPEAKER

A special feature of the 27th Mational will e the appearance of former U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough of Texas. He will speak in the Ezekiel Cullen Auditorium at 3:45 p.m. Wednesday, Harch 24 on the topic -- "State Prayer and the Freedom of Expression: The Governments Proposed Commandment." A Democratic "liberal" in "conservative" Texas, the 68 year old politician was first elected to the Senate in

1957 and continued in office until 1970. He was defeated in the primary last spring by Houstonian Lloyd Bentson,

sending party liberals into a deep depression.

During his Senatorial career Yarborough fought for minority groups, labor and education. He opposed U.S. military involvment in Southeast Asia and worked for 18 year old voting. A native of Chandler, Texas, he has had a long career of public service, in addition to his own law practice. He was an assistant attorney general and a judge. He tried for Texas governor three times and attorney general once. Yarborough's political future is uncertain but Texas liberals are hoping...
