FIVE MAKE FINALS IN COUNCIL RACE

Terry Cole, Appalachian State University; Gary Horn, Southwestern College; Penny Swisher, William Jewell College; Frank Lower, Louisiana State Univer-sity at Shreveport; and Harold Widvey, South Dakota State University, were named finalists in the race for three seats on the PKD National Council.

Voting for the final three has been continued through Saturday to allow all chapters to vote. A possible further runoff election could develop if ties occur in the voting. The final determination of winners and the announcement of new council is expected at the Final Business Meeting today.

CONVENTION ACTS ON ELEVEN AMENDMENTS

The third Business Session of this PKD Convention responded to President Roger Hufford's request to use parliamentary procedure to speed rather than delay action and handled eleven proposed constitutional amendments in less than thirty minutes a record for convention action.

The results reflected the changing attitudes in PKD. delegates approved voluntary attendance at National Conventions, defeated the same proposal for provinces, approved use of non-council members as chairmen of standing committees, divided research and public relations into two committees, and provided an alternate method for naming student members of National Council.

In handling initiated measures the convention defeated restrictions on the Editor of The Forensic and approved a moderate change in the purpose statement of PKD. The delegates failed to give any sup-port to proposals which would limit the National Convention and Tournament to specific days, fix initiation fees at \$10.00, or require a two-thirds vote to change chapter fees.

AWARD-WINNING PAPERS PRESENTED

A paper by N. Anway Jones and another by Wayne Thompson and his subcommittee on research were the award-winning papers in the competitive paper competition initiated this year.

At the 8:30 Saturday program, Jones examined the value issues which develop in CEDA and NDT debate and offered comparisons and contrasts which have developed in the two debating styles.

Thompson and his co-authors used a survey technique to examine current definitions and attitudes related to CEDA debate.

The presentations attracted a sizable audience of students and coaches. Walter Murrish told The Key that he was pleased with the positive reception of the research programing. He predicts increased growth in such programs at future PKD National Conventions.
